EFFICIENCY OF TRADITIONAL METHODS VERSUS INNOVATIVE METHODS IN LEARNING SPANISH

Traditional methods, of the expository or frontal type, seem to no longer correspond to the new principles of active and conscious student participation. However, they can become valuable in a context where there is a large number of participants, with a cultural level that facilitates access to information within a given time frame. Currently, didactic methodology is oriented towards the active and conscious involvement of students in their learning process and the stimulation of their creativity. In this context, the changes experienced by teaching methods follow various defining directions. The dynamic and open relationship consists of the continuous evolution of interactions between different methods. The diversity of methods is imposed by the complexity of the learning process, and each method must be chosen based on the context to which it refers. Emphasizing the formative nature of methods involves focusing on the social relationships that the student develops in the process of culturalization and personality formation. The constant reassessment of traditional methods aims to adapt them to needs and integrate them into scientific evolution.

In traditional education, the main method of cultivating thinking involves the teacher's exposition, supplemented by individual student study. This approach has been criticized, arguing that it does not promote a proper connection with practice. The passivity of students in the face of exposition contributes to a lack of connection with reality, as they merely observe and repeat information.

In another well-known traditional method, the whole-class discussion, students participate more actively, but they are guided and do not have a clear understanding of the

objectives. Thus, traditional education contributes to a small extent to the development of students' thinking.

Some time ago, alternative educational models, known as active schools were proposed, where the emphasis is on individual study conducted by students. This new and active approach has proven to be superior but requires more time. With some adjustments in school programs within the educational reforms, an activation of a new teaching process is anticipated in the Romanian education system.

Specialized literature provides a detailed perspective on the antithesis between traditional and modern methods used in the teaching process. Traditional methods are characterized by:

- Emphasis on content acquisition, focusing primarily on the informative aspect of education;
- Focus on the teacher's instructional activity, with the student treated as a recipient of instruction, resulting in mostly one-directional communication;
- o Prevalence of formal communication;
- Predominant orientation towards the final product, with assessment essentially consisting of knowledge reproduction;
- o Formal nature and promotion of competition;
- o Stimulation of extrinsic motivation for learning;
- A teacher-student relationship with an autocratic nuance, where school discipline is imposed.

These methods generate passivity among students. On the other hand, modern methods are highlighted by the following aspects:

- Priority given to the development of students' personalities, focusing on the formative aspect of education;
- Focus on the student's learning activity, making them the subject of the educational process;
- o Orientation towards action and discovery-based learning;
- o Emphasis on the process;
- o Flexibility, encouraging cooperative learning and students' self-assessment capabilities, with formative assessment.
- o Stimulation of intrinsic motivation;
- o A teacher-student relationship of a democratic nature, based on respect and collaboration, with discipline derived from the lesson's organization.

This contrast between traditional and modern methods illustrates the shift from teacher-centered to student-centered approaches in contemporary education.

2. The Evolution of Traditional Methods in Learning the Spanish Language

This aspect reveals a significant transition from more conservative approaches to more interactive and tailored educational practices for contemporary students. However, the limitations of this approach became increasingly evident with changes in the understanding of the learning process and the need to develop authentic communication skills in the Spanish language. Within this evolution, methods began to shift towards more interactive and real-life-relevant practices. In recent decades, communicative approaches have become predominant in foreign language instruction, including the teaching of the Spanish language. These methods focus on developing oral and written communication skills, placing particular emphasis on real-life language use situations. Students are encouraged to interact, discuss current topics, and apply linguistic knowledge in practical contexts.

Additionally, the use of modern technologies in teaching the Spanish language has brought new dimensions to the learning process. Online platforms, educational apps, and multimedia resources have become essential tools for diversifying and enhancing the Spanish language learning experience.

These comparative results highlight the strengths and weaknesses of both traditional and innovative methods in teaching the Spanish language, emphasizing the importance of a balanced and adaptable approach to meet the diverse needs of students.
